FOOTBALL.

SCHOOL HOUSE v. HUTCHINSON'S, Nov. 23rd.

—The School House won the toss and took the Island goal. Hutchinson's therefore had kick-off, and secured a decided advantage thereby, but the match was very equal in penning, though the School House secured a punt-out and one touch down.

Nov. 28.—The School House had kick-off, and, making good use of it, kept the ball for the whole match on the School side of the Three Trees, though they only managed to get two touches down.

Dec. 3.—The School House immediately took the ball to the School side of the Three Trees and kept it there throughout, obtaining a try at goal, unsuccessfully kicked by Sidgwick, ma., and four touches down.

For the School House Westfeldt, ma., whether in person or through his substitutes, (Francis 1st day, Reynolds 2nd Day), played well throughout. We also noticed Moberly, Cholmondeley, Hudson and Morris.—For Hutchinson's, Sidebotham, Gwyer, Isherwood, Eddis, and Boyd, played very well.

HUTCHINSON'S v. ELSEE'S.—This match, for "Second House," was begun December 5th. Elsee's winning the toss chose the Island goal, in favour of which was a strong wind. Hutchinson's gained considerably by the kick off, but after the first scrummage Gardner made a good run to the Barby-road side. Elsee's now penned considerably, and though Hutchinson's forwards, after some time, got into the middle of the ground again, Tobin ma., by a splendid run, nearly got in on the Chapel side; and immediately after, Gray touched the ball down in goal. It was, however, too near touch to be punted out, and fell in touch-in-goal, where it was again driven soon after the take-out. A fine run of Mackinlay's alone saved Hutchinson's from touching it down again. After this, by some fine forward play, they got as far as the Three Trees, where "No side" was called. For Elsee's Tobin ma. and Gardner (Bowden Smith's, for Tinkler) half-back, Gray, Reynolds, and Sidgwick (S. H. for Dugdale) forward; and for Hutchinson's Gwyer, Isherwood, and Eddis forward, Boyd half-back, and Mackinlay back played best. Parton (Wilson's) played half-back for Gordon, Ralli for Bassett, and Weston for Warner.
